NEED FOR THE RULE(S):

The rules are needed to implement winter, spring, and summer 2026 Select Area commercial salmon fisheries. The assessment of preseason abundance forecasts and expected harvest affirm these fisheries are within allowable harvest levels.

JUSTIFICATION OF TEMPORARY FILING:

There is insufficient time to initiate the permanent rulemaking process to open the commercial fishing periods by the specified date and time.

Fisheries are managed to provide treaty, recreational, and commercial fishing opportunities while meeting species- or stock-specific allocations and remaining within ESA guidelines.

Failure to open these fisheries would deny commercial fishers the opportunity to harvest then sell their share of this valuable resource in Oregon.

Youngs Bay Select Area Commercial Fishery ¶

(1) Salmon (except Chum) may be taken with gillnets for commercial purposes during open fishing periods in Youngs Bay/as described below: ¶

(a) The Youngs Bay Select Area is defined as waters of Youngs Bay and Youngs River southeasterly of the Highway 101 Bridge upstream to the regulatory marker(s) at the confluence of the Klaskanine and Youngs rivers, including the Walluski River downstream of the Highway 202 Bridge, and the Lewis and Clark River north (downstream) of the overhead power lines approximately 500 feet south (upstream) of Barrett Slough: ¶

(b) The Upper Youngs Bay Area includes all waters within the Youngs Bay Select Area upstream of the old Youngs Bay Bridge. ¶

(c) The Walluski Area includes all waters within the Youngs Bay Select Area upstream of the overhead powerlines crossing Youngs River approximately 500 yards northerly (downstream) of the Walluski River. ¶

(2) The open fishing periods are established in four segments categorized as the winter season in subsection (2)(a); the spring season in subsection (2)(b); the summer season in subsection (2)(c), and the fall season in subsection (2)(d) as follows: ¶

(a) Gill nets may not exceed 1,500 feet (250 fathoms) in length and lead line weight may not exceed two pounds per any one fathom, except as described in (3)(b) below. ¶

(b) When the following waters are open to commercial fishing, the use of additional weights or anchors attached directly to the lead line is permitted in these areas: ¶

(A) Youngs River upstream of regulatory markers located approximately 200 yards southerly (upstream) of the mouth of the Walluski River. ¶

(B) In the lower Walluski River from the first dock near the mouth upstream to the Highway 202 Bridge. ¶

(C) In the Lewis and Clark River from the Alternate Highway 101 Bridge upstream to the overhead power lines approximately 500 feet southerly (upstream) of Barrett Slough. ¶

(c) A red cork must be placed on the corkline every 25 fathoms as measured from the first mesh of the net. Red corks at 25-fathom intervals must be in color contrast to the corks used in the remainder of the net. ¶

(d) Nets not specifically authorized for use may be onboard a vessel if properly stored. A properly stored net is defined as a net on a drum that is fully covered by a tarp (canvas or plastic) and bound with a minimum of ten revolutions of rope with a diameter of 3/8 (0.375) inches or greater. ¶

(4) Non-resident commercial fishing and boat licenses are not required for Washington fishers participating in Youngs Bay commercial fisheries. A valid fishing and boat license issued by the state of Washington is considered adequate for participation in this fishery. The open area for non-resident commercial fishers includes all areas open for commercial fishing.

Blind Slough and Knappa Slough Select Area Commercial Fishery

(1) Salmon (except Chum) may be taken with gillnets for commercial purposes during open fishing periods in Blind Slough and Knappa Slough as described below: ¶

(a) The Blind Slough Select Area is defined as waters of Blind Slough and Gnat Creek from a north-south line represented by regulatory markers at the mouth of Blind Slough upstream to a regulatory marker in Gnat Creek located approximately 0.5 miles southeasterly (upstream) of the Barendse Road Bridge. ¶

(b) Upper Blind Slough is defined as Oregon state waters of the Blind Slough Select Area upstream of the railroad bridge, located approximately 1.25 miles east (upstream) of the mouth of Blind Slough. ¶

(c) The Knappa Slough Select Area is defined as waters of Knappa Slough, Calendar Slough, and Big Creek Slough bounded to the north (upstream) by a line projecting from a regulatory marker on the eastern shore of Karlson Island to the northernmost regulatory marker at the mouth of Blind Slough and bounded to the west (downstream) by a line projecting southerly from a regulatory marker on the southwestern tip of Karlson Island through regulatory markers on the western tips of Minaker Island to a marker on the Oregon shore. The waters of Knappa Slough within a 100-foot radius of the railroad bridge crossing Big Creek are closed. ¶

(2) Open fishing periods are established in four segments categorized as the winter season in subsection (2)(a); the spring season in subsection (2)(b); the summer season in subsection (2)(c); and the fall season in subsection (2)(d). ¶

(a) Winter Season: ¶

(A) Open area includes the Blind Slough and Knappa Slough Select Areas defined in (1)(a) and (1)(c) above, except the downstream (western) boundary in Knappa Slough is a north-south line projecting through the easternmost tip of Minaker Island and regulatory markers on Karlson Island and the Oregon shore. ¶

(B) The minimum mesh size is 7-inches. ¶

(C) Open fishing periods are as follows: ¶

(i) February 15 through March 20, each Sunday, Tuesday, and Thursday from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. the following day; and ¶

(ii) March 23 through April 14, each Monday and Thursday from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. the following day. ¶

(b) Spring Season: ¶

(A) Open area includes the Blind Slough and Knappa Slough Select Areas defined in (1)(a) and (1)(c) above, except through the first Friday in May the downstream (western) boundary in Knappa Slough is a north-south line projecting through the easternmost tip of Minaker Island and regulatory markers on Karlson Island and the Oregon shore. ¶

(B) The maximum mesh size is 9.75-inches. ¶

(C) Open fishing periods are as follows: ¶

(i) April 16 through April 24, each Monday and Thursday from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. the following day; ¶

(ii) April 27 through May 1, each Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. the following day; ¶

(iii) May 4 through May 15, each Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. the

(1) Salmon (except Chum) may be taken with gillnets for commercial purposes during open fishing periods in Tongue Point and South Channel as described below: ¶

(a) The Tongue Point Select Area is defined as waters of the Columbia River bounded by a line from a regulatory marker on the eastern shore of Tongue Point (midway between the red USCG light "2" at the tip of Tongue Point and the northern-most pier (#8) at the Tongue Point Job Corps facility) to the flashing green USCG light "3" on the rock jetty at the northwest tip of Mott Island, a line from a regulatory marker at the southeast end of Mott Island northeasterly to a regulatory marker on the northwest shore of Lois Island, and a line from a regulatory marker located on the Oregon shore approximately 300 yards northwest of the railroad bridge crossing the John Day River projecting easterly to a regulatory marker on the southwest shore of Lois Island. ¶

(A) If the marker on the eastern shore of Tongue Point is not in place, the downstream boundary is defined by a line projecting from a point (46°12'31.1"N latitude 123°45'34.0"W longitude) on the eastern shore of Tongue Point to the flashing green USCG light "3" on the rock jetty at the northwest tip of Mott Island. ¶

(B) If the marker on the Oregon shore is not in place, the upstream boundary is defined by a line projecting from a point (46°10'57.7"N latitude 123°44'35.3"W longitude) on the Oregon shore approximately 300 yards northwest of the railroad bridge crossing the John Day River projecting easterly to a regulatory marker on Lois Island. ¶

(b) The Tongue Point Winter-Spring Subarea is defined as waters of the Columbia River bounded by a line from the end of the southern-most pier (#1) at the Tongue Point Job Corps facility projecting in a straight line through flashing red USCG light "6" to the shore of Mott Island, a line from a regulatory marker at the southeast end of Mott Island northeasterly to a regulatory marker on the northwest shore of Lois Island, and a line from a regulatory marker located on the Oregon shore approximately 300 yards northwest of the railroad bridge crossing the John Day River projecting easterly to a regulatory marker on the southwest shore of Lois Island. If the marker on the Oregon shore is not in place, the upper boundary is defined by a line projecting easterly from a point (46°10'57.7"N latitude 123°44'35.3"W longitude) on the Oregon shore approximately 300 yards northwest of the railroad bridge crossing the John Day River to a regulatory marker on the southwest shore of Lois Island. ¶

(c) The South Channel Select Area is defined as waters of the Columbia River bounded by a line from a regulatory marker on the Oregon shore at John Day Point projecting northeasterly to a regulatory marker on the southwest shore of Lois Island, and a line from a regulatory marker on Settler Point projecting northwesterly to the flashing red USCG light "10" then projecting westerly to the eastern tip of Burnside Island. ¶

(2) Open fishing periods are established in four segments categorized as the winter season in subsection (2)(a); the spring season in subsection (2)(b); the summer season in subsection (2)(c); and the fall season in subsection (2)(d). ¶

(a) Winter Season: ¶

(A) Open area includes the Tongue Point Winter-Spring Subarea and the South Channel Select Area defined in (1)(b) and (1)(c) above. ¶

~~(B) Open fishing period is February 15 through March 13, each Sunday, Tuesday, and Thursday from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. the following day; ¶~~

(b) During the fall season, the Deep River Select Area is defined as waters bounded by a line at the mouth of Deep River from USCG marker "16" southwest to a marker on the Washington shore, upstream to the West Deep River Road Bridge at the town of Deep River. ¶¶

(2) Open fishing periods are established in four segments categorized as the winter season in subsection (2)(a); the spring season in subsection (2)(b); the summer season in subsection (2)(c); and the fall season in subsection (2)(d). ¶¶

(a) Winter Season: ¶¶

(A) Open area includes the Deep River Select Area defined in sub-section (1)(a) above. ¶¶

(B) The minimum mesh size is 7-inches. ¶¶

(C) Open fishing periods are as follows: ¶¶

(i) February 15 through March 20, each Sunday, Tuesday, and Thursday from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m. the following day; and ¶¶

(b) There is no lead line weight limit and attachment of additional weight or anchors directly to the lead line is permitted.¶

(c) Nets may not be tied off to stationary structures.¶

(d) Nets may not fully cross the navigation channel.¶

(e) It is unlawful to operate any gillnet gear longer than three-fourths the width of the river which is defined as bank-to-bank, where the water meets the banks, regardless of the time of tide or the water level.¶

(f) Nets not specifically authorized for use may be onboard a vessel if properly stored. A properly stored net is defined as a net on a drum that is fully covered by a tarp (canvas or plastic) and bound with a minimum of ten revolutions of rope with a diameter of 3/8 (0.375) inches or greater.
