# Sage-Grouse Plan Update

23 24

Presenters: Richard Whitman, Governor's Office, Natural Resources Policy Director Judge Steve Grasty, Harney County Judge via Phone

Richard Whitman, Governor's Office, Natural Resources Policy Director

In 2010 the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services (USFWS) made a decision that the listing of the greater sage-grouse is warranted but precluded. Since that time USFWS has been working hard with partners to strengthen our conservations measures for greater sage-grouse. Those partners include Harney County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Oregon Cattlemen's Association. We have several issues that need to be addressed and put Oregon in a good position so that we either avoid the federal listing of the sage-grouse, or if there is a listing we have measures in place that make it likely that the USFWS that will allow Oregon to continue its own management of sage-grouse.

	Your staff has been working closely with the Governor's office and with our partners and we are close to having a first draft for addressing the habitat issues that works for both the sage-grouse habitat and the economy in that part of rural Oregon. We need the Commission to look at its adopted sage-grouse conservation rules and make sure we are in alignment.
Judge Steve Grasty, Harney County Judge	Commend Richard Whitman, the Commission and the ODFW staff for their efforts for protecting the sage-grouse and the habitat. Real solutions are locally generated. Please keep local communication and collaboration at the top of the list as we work through this issue and we will be able to protect the habitat.

## Discussion:

### **Commissioner Finley**

Human intrusions provide perching sites for ravens to which then prey on eggs, and chicks of the sage-grouse. Is there something analogous with Oregon's ravens, do we have any research or anecdotal observations and I didn't see predation in the mix at all?

## **Jackie Cupples**

Sage-grouse overall are destined to be preyed upon. Certainly predation is one component of its life history. We don't have any studies in Oregon that specifically point to predation as being a limiting factor. In fact, the USFWS did not cite predation as being a limiting factor in their 2010 findings. In our state we have not documented that it is being a contributing factor.

#### **Commissioner Anderson**

What is the overall scope for the state?

#### Richard Whitman

The total package for the SageCon effort is just under \$4.5 million. It includes support for primarily range fund fire protection in both training and assistance from the Oregon Department of Forestry and equipment as well as money for juniper removal and addressing the invasive weeds. The size of the need to address the threats is far higher than the amount of money in the budget.

### **Commissioner Wolley**

What are the constraints here in Oregon using prescribed fire as a tool?

# **Jackie Cupples**

When using prescribed fire you have to look at the latest research looking at the resistance of sites that is related to soil moisture and temperatures regimes. Depending on the aspect the elevation and the original underlying vegetation that was present before you are even considering a burn can really impact what you get back after that burn is completed.

#### **Commissioner Akenson**

Who will be responsible for the overall implementation of this plan?

#### **Richard Whitman**

We are looking at this very carefully and how do you manage it over the long-term. We are still working out the details of that, but there is a high level commitment from USFWS, BLM, the state and the counties to have an ongoing entity set up by MOA between all the levels of government. That will essentially be a governing council for implementation of this effort and coordination of this across federal and non-federal lands. There is also been an ongoing active support through the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board for this plan in terms of funding.

## **Commissioner Wolley**

How much of the universal interest in the sage-grouse has to do with the fact that it is a game species?

#### **Eric Rickerson**

There is a lot of interest in it being a game species because the vast bulk of the funding for management of sage-grouse was coming from hunter license dollars. We run a very conservative harvest season well below what research indicates would be impacting population levels. In fact, we harvest about 2 to 3% of our fall population through a very tightly controlled season.

**Debbie Colbert** 

For the Coastal Multi-Species plan, it was approximately \$350,000 of Lottery Funds, to perform some enhanced fish production and about \$700,000 for other work under the plan. Overall the plan will go forward, this ask was additional work proposed.

**Commissioner Akenson** 

What are other alternative funding strategies for funding the Oregon Conservation Strategy Implementation that was denied?

**Debbie Colbert** 

We don't have any other specific funding included in the Governor's budget. We continue to look for alternative revenue to support our conservation programs and we'll continue to work with the Governor's office and the Commission along those lines.

**Northwest Angling Zone Sport Angling Regulations Modified** 

Adopted October 1, 2014: effective October 15, 2014 through December 31, 2014 This amended rule modifies previously filed temporary rule language which implied permission to angle from the Big Creek railroad trestle bridge (private property, Clatsop County) since this agency lacks sufficient authority to grant the fishing public access to private properties. Further modifications amend the July 16-November 30 closure period for Trask River Hatchery Hole, originally put in place to protect hatchery spring chinook, fall chinook and Coho broodstock, to allow fishing beginning October 16, 2014. District managers determined that all spring Chinook broodstock will have been collected and spawned before October 15, moderate to large surpluses of fall Chinook and Coho in

spawned before October 15, moderate to la excess of broodstock needs are expected.

46 Krumbo Reservoir Open for Angling through End of 2014

Adopted October 1, 2014: effective November 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014

- 1 This amended rule extends the open period for angling at Krumbo Reservoir in Harney
- 2 County in the Southeast Angling Zone through December 31, 2014. A recent change to
- 3 policy at the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge allows year round fishing at Krumbo.
- 4 Permanent sport fishing rules for 2014 close the reservoir from November 1 through the
- 5 end of the year. Permanent rules for 2015 will allow year round fishing at Krumbo,
- 6 except ice fishing will be prohibited.

- 12 The amended rule allows the sport harvest of three adipose fin-clipped Coho in each of
- the Tualatin, Yamhill, Molalla, Santiam, and Willamette (Section 2 only) rivers beginning
- 14 Thursday, October 15, 2014. These modifications allow sport anglers opportunities to
- 15 harvest substantial numbers of Coho that are returning to the Willamette River and
- 16 tributaries above the Willamette Falls.

## Amend Rules to Add Ohio to Cervid Part Importation Ban

- Adopted October 28, 2014: effective October 28, 2014 through April 26, 2015
- 16 This temporary rule amends rules to add Ohio to the list of states from which the
- importation of certain cervid parts is banned. In June 2003, the Fish and Wildlife
- 18 Commission adopted rules banning the importation of certain cervid parts from those
- 19 states with documented cases of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD). The rules noted that
- the Department would add additional states to the rules as new cases of CWD were
- documented. Based on new information, the Director amends the rule to add Ohio to
- 22 the list of states from which cervid parts may not be imported. Following the permanent
- rule making process, rather than taking this temporary rule making action, will result in
- serious prejudice to the public interest because it would delay banning the importation
- of cervid parts from a state with documented cases of CWD. The purpose of the cervid
- parts ban is to protect Oregon's wildlife from disease. The purpose can only be carried
- out only if the ban covers all states affected by CWD, and the ban takes effect soon
- enough to intercept parts ban from those states. Failure to promptly add Ohio to the parts import ban could expose Oregon to risk of disease. The temporary rulemaking
- parts import ban could expose Oregon to risk of disease. The temporary rulemaking action will avoid this consequence by adding Ohio to the list of banned states
- 31 immediately.
