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Expenditure Report

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Staff: Bill Herber, Deputy Director for Administration

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Department wide, expenditures continue to be within available revenue. Vacancy savings and reduced expenditures are still the norm across the board for all expenditure areas, which accounts for the lower than projected revenue. While expenditures are significantly lower than the half-way point for the biennium, seems to indicate this is a typical spend pattern for the first year of a biennium. Typically, vacancies and programs take a period of time to ramp up, resulting in the lower spend rate for the first half of the biennium.

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Department cash balances (operational reserves) continued to show growth.

- Unrestricted cash balance is currently around \$30.6 million while restricted cash is 32
- 33 about \$21.7 million. This marks the first time since our current tracking efforts that
- unrestricted cash broke the \$30 million level and total cash is above \$50 million. It is 34

Commercial Spring Salmon and Shad Fisheries for Columbia River Select Areas Modified

Adopted June 9, 2016: effective June 16, 2016 through July 31, 2016.

This amended rule adds three new 12-hour fishing periods in Blind and Knappa sloughs, and two new 12-hour periods in the Tongue Point/South Channel commercial spring Chinook fisheries of the Columbia River of the Select Areas. Modifications are consistent with action taken June 9, 2016 by the Oregon and Washington Departments of Fish and Wildlife at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

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3) 635-042-0027

Columbia River Commercial Summer Chinook Drift Net Fishery Set for June 16, 2016

Adopted June 9, 2016: effective June 16, 2016 through July 31, 2016.

This amended rule authorizes an 8-hour non-Indian commercial summer Chinook drift net fishery in the mainstem Columbia River to commence on Thursday, June 16 at 9:00 p.m. and run through 5:00 a.m. Friday, June 17, 2016 (8 hours) in all of zones 1 through 5. Modifications are consistent with action taken June 9, 2016 by the Oregon and Washington Departments of Fish and Wildlife at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

4) 635-017-0090

Additional Opportunity for Personal Use Harvest of Pacific Lamprey at Willamette Falls Allowed

Adopted June 15, 2016: effective June 16, 2016 through September 30, 2016.

This amended rule allows three additional days for personal use harvest of Pacific lamprey at Willamette Falls, beginning on Tuesday, June 21 through Thursday, June 23, 2016, by individuals with the required permit. This season modification provides opportunity for harvest of Pacific lamprey following the rescheduled installation of water flow devices at Willamette Falls. All other regulations for the harvest of Pacific lamprey remain unchanged.

2016 Columbia River Summer Recreational Fisheries Implemented

Adopted June 9, 2016: effective June 16, 2016 through July 31, 2016.

This amended rule implements the 2016 summer recreational salmon fishing season on the Columbia River. Modifications to regulations for 2016 conform to regulation changes developed through this year's Pacific Fishery Management Council/North of Falcon process. Corrections to the regulations were made to ensure rule consistency with the State of Washington.

6) 635-042-0160 and 635-042-0170

Additional Commercial Spring Salmon and Shad Fishing Periods Authorized for Columbia River Select Areas

Adopted June 22, 2016: effective June 23, 2016 through July 31, 2016.

This amended rule adds one new 12-hour fishing period in Blind and Knappa sloughs, and two new 12-hour periods in the Tongue Point/South Channel commercial

spring Chinook fisheries of the Columbia River of the Select Areas. Modifications are consistent with action taken June 22, 2016 by the Oregon and Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

7) 635-023-0095

July 1 White Sturgeon Recreational Fishery in Bonneville Pool Rescinded

Adopted June 22, 2016: effective June 30, 2016 through December 26, 2016.

This amended rule rescinds the recreational white sturgeon fishery in the Bonneville Pool that was previously scheduled to begin July 1, 2016 for one day only. The annual guideline for the Bonneville Pool has been attained. Revisions are consistent with action taken June 22, 2016 by the Departments of Fish and Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

8) 635-019-0090

Spring Chinook Fisheries Open July 2 on the Wallowa River

Adopted June 24, 2016: effective July 2, 2016 through August 31, 2016.

This amended rule allows recreational anglers opportunities to harvest adipose finclipped adult Chinook salmon and adipose fin-clipped jack Chinook salmon, which are in excess of the Department's hatchery production needs, in the Wallowa River beginning Saturday, July 2, 2016 and until harvest guidelines are met.

Spring Chinook Fisheries Close in the Imnaha River

Adopted June 27, 2016: effective July 3, 2016 through August 31, 2016.

This amended rule closes the recreational spring Chinook fishery on the Imnaha River. This amended rule closes the recreational spring Chinook fishery on the Imnaha River at 11:59 p.m. Sunday, July 3, 2016. The harvest guideline for the fishery is expected to be attained by that time.

10) 635-004-0275 and 635-004-0355

In-season Adjustments to Trip Limits for the Commercial Nearshore and Sablefish Fisheries

Adopted June 29, 2016: effective July 5, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

These amended rules implement in-season trip limit adjustments for the Oregon commercial nearshore fishery, and adopt federal in-season decreases to sablefish trip limits. Federal in-season decreases are adopted by reference in Oregon's administrative rules. Black rockfish trip limits will be increased from 1,600 to 2,400 pounds in period 4, from 1,400 to 2,200 pounds in period 5, and from 1,000 to 1,800 pounds in period 6. In addition, 2016 trip limits for blue rockfish increased from 30 to 50 pounds. Other nearshore rockfish increased from 200 to 350 pounds, and greenling from 400 to 600 pounds for periods 4, 5 and 6.

Commercial Sardine Fishery Requirements for 2016-2017

Adopted June 29, 2016: effective July 1, 2016 through November 30, 2016.

This amended rule modifies Oregon's commercial sardine fisheries and brings the State of Oregon concurrent with federally adopted regulations. Modifications establish

2016-17 sardine harvest guidelines and incidental landing allowances for Oregon's commercial fisheries.

12) 635-042-0160 and 635-042-0170

Commercial Salmon and Shad Fishing Periods Authorized for Columbia River Select Areas

Adopted June 30, 2016: effective June 30, 2016 through July 31, 2016.

This amended rule adds two new 12-hour fishing periods in both the Blind and Knappa sloughs, and in the Tongue Point/South Channel commercial salmon fisheries of the Columbia River Select Areas. Modifications are consistent with action taken June 30, 2016 by the Oregon and Washington Departments of Fish and Wildlife at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

13) 635-041-0076

Treaty Indian Commercial Summer Salmon Fisheries Set

Adopted June 30, 2016: effective July 5, 2016 through August 31, 2016.

This amended rule authorizes the sales of fish caught in two 3-and-a-half day Treaty Indian commercial salmon gillnet fisheries above Bonneville Dam in the Columbia River. The first fishing period begins at 6:00 a.m. Tuesday, July 5 and the second period begins at 6:00 a.m. Monday, July 11. Modifications are consistent with action taken June 30, 2016 by the Departments of Fish and Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington in cooperation with the Columbia River Treaty Tribes at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

14) 635-042-0160 and 635-042-0170

Commercial Salmon and Shad Fishing Periods Authorized for Columbia River Select Areas

Adopted July 6, 2016: effective July 7, 2016 through July 31, 2016.

This amended rule adds two new 12-hour commercial salmon fishing periods to both the Blind and Knappa sloughs and the Tongue Point/South Channel Select Area fisheries on the Columbia River. Modifications are consistent with action taken July 6, 2016 by the Oregon and Washington Departments of Fish and Wildlife at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

15) 635-041-0076

Treaty Indian Commercial Summer Salmon Fishery Modified

Adopted July 6, 2016: effective July 11, 2016 through July 31, 2016.

This amended rule modifies gear restrictions for a previously authorized 3-and-a-half day Treaty Indian commercial salmon gillnet fishery in the Columbia River above Bonneville Dam. The modified fishery begins at 6:00 a.m. Monday, July 11, 2016. Modifications are consistent with action taken July 6, 2016 by the Departments of Fish and Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington, in cooperation with the Columbia River Treaty Tribes, at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

16) 635-042-0027

Columbia River Commercial Summer Chinook Drift Net Fishery Set for July 11, 2016

Adopted July 6, 2016: effective July 11, 2016 through July 31, 2016.

This amended rule authorizes an 8-hour non-Indian commercial summer Chinook drift net fishery in the mainstem Columbia River to commence on Monday, July 11 at 9:00 p.m. and run through 5:00 a.m. Tuesday, July 12, 2016 (8 hours) in all of zones 1 through 5. Modifications are consistent with action taken July 6, 2016 by the Oregon and Washington Departments of Fish and Wildlife at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

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17) 635-006-0210

Electronic Fish Tickets Reporting Commercial Sales Required for Limited Fish Sellers

Adopted July 12, 2016: effective July 29, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

This amended rule requires, by way of electronic fish receiving tickets (e-ticket), the reporting of commercial sales of salmon, sturgeon, smelt and shad landed by "Limited" fish dealers. This rule already requires wholesale fish dealers, wholesale fish bait dealers, and food fish canners to report sales by way of e-tickets. Modifications also require Limited Fish Sellers' e-tickets be submitted within 24 hours of the closure of a fishing period or within 24 hours of the landing when fishing periods are longer than 24 hours.

18) 635-039-0090

In-season Modification to Ocean Recreational Groundfish Depth Restriction

Adopted July 11, 2016: effective July 14, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

This amended rule changes the season closure regulations for rockfish from outside the 30-fathom regulatory curve to outside the 20-fathom curve; and closes the ocean to retention of groundfish outside the 20-fathom curve (as defined by coordinates) from 11:59 p.m. July 14 through December 31, 2016. This action is intended to reduce bycatch mortality of yelloweye rockfish, as the fishery is projected to exceed the allocation within current depth restrictions.

These modifications replaced the depth restrictions and closure dates on page 77 of the **2016 Oregon Sport Fishing Regulations** shown under the "season" column for: "Rockfish, Greenling, Pacific Cod, Cabezon, Skates, Spiny Dogfish, Leopard Shark, Soupfin Shark, Topsmelt, Jacksmelt, and other marine species not listed here on page 77."

19) 635-042-0160 and 635-042-0170

Commercial Salmon and Shad Fishing Periods Authorized for Columbia River Select Areas

Adopted July 13, 2016: effective July 14, 2016 through July 31, 2016.

This amended rule adds two new 12-hour commercial salmon fishing periods to both the Blind and Knappa sloughs and the Tongue Point/South Channel Select Area fisheries on the Columbia River. Modifications are consistent with action taken July 13, 2016 by the Oregon and Washington Departments of Fish and Wildlife at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

20) 635-041-0076

Treaty Indian Commercial Summer Salmon Fishery Extended

Adopted July 13, 2016: effective July 18, 2016 through July 31, 2016.

This amended rule authorizes two new 4.5 day fishing periods to the ongoing Treaty Indian commercial salmon gill net fishery in the Columbia River above Bonneville Dam. The first new fishing period begins at 6:00 a.m. Monday, July 18 and runs through 6:00 p.m. Friday, July 22, 2016. The second period begins at 6:00 a.m. Monday, July 25 and runs through 6:00 p.m. Friday, July 29, 2016). Modifications are consistent with action taken July 13, 2016 by the Departments of Fish and Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington, in cooperation with the Columbia River Treaty Tribes, at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

21) 635-019-0090

Spring Chinook Fisheries Close on the Wallowa River

Adopted July 15, 2016: effective July 18, 2016 through August 31, 2016.

This amended rule closes the recreational spring Chinook fishery on the Wallowa River which opened July 2, 2016. Due to near-zero angler participation and the expectation of warmer water temperatures, fisheries managers have decided to close the Wallowa River spring Chinook fishery at the end of the day on Sunday, July 24, 2016.

22) 635-023-0130

2016 Columbia River Fall Recreational Salmon Seasons Set

Adopted July 27, 2016: effective August 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

This amended rule sets the 2016 fall recreational Chinook salmon season regulations for the mainstem Columbia River, effective August 1, 2016. Modifications were based on 2016 Non-Indian Columbia River Summer/Fall Fishery Allocation Agreement (5/31/16) that was developed during the Pacific Fisheries Management Council (PFMC) and North of Falcon (NOF) meetings. Fall fisheries in 2016 are structured to optimize the harvest of Chinook, coho and steelhead within Endangered Species Act (ESA) limits and to provide a balanced opportunity for the fishers.

Regulations for Mark Selective Fall Chinook Fisheries in Lower Columbia River Tributaries

Adopted July 20, 2016: effective August 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016

This amended rule addresses a conservation need for Endangered Species Act (ESA) listed Lower Columbia River Fall Chinook (tules). These modifications restrict harvest of hatchery Fall Chinook in an effort to allow additional ESA listed wild Fall Chinook to escape to natural spawning areas. These regulation changes are being proposed for adoption as permanent rules, effective January 1, 2017.

Treaty Indian Sturgeon Setline Fishery in Bonneville Pool of the Columbia River Implemented

Adopted July 27, 2016: effective August 1, 2016 through August 13, 2016.

Amended rule allows commercial sales of fish caught during the Treaty Indian Fall sturgeon setline fishery in The Bonneville Pool of the Columbia River. The fishery begins at 6:00 a.m. Monday, August 1 and runs through 6:00 p.m. Saturday, August 13, 2016. Implementation is consistent with action taken July 27, 2016 by the Departments of Fish & Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington in cooperation with the Columbia River Treaty Tribes at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

25) 635-041-0045 and 635-041-0075

Sales from Columbia River Treaty Indian Fall Commercial Fisheries Authorized Adopted July 27, 2016: effective August 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

These amended rules authorize the sales of fish caught in fall Treaty tribal platform commercial fisheries set for the Columbia River from 12:01 a.m. Monday, August 1 through 6:00 p.m. Saturday, December 31, 2016. Modifications are consistent with action taken July 27, 2016 by the Departments of Fish and Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington in cooperation with the Columbia River Treaty Tribes at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

26) 635-042-0145 and 635-042-0180

Fall Commercial Seasons Set for Deep River and Youngs Bay Select Areas Adopted July 27, 2016: effective August 1, 2016 through October 31, 2016.

These amended rules implement the 2016 fall commercial salmon and shad seasons for the Deep River and Youngs Bay Select Areas. The first authorized fishing period in the Deep River Select Area is set to begin August 1. The first fishing period authorized for the Youngs Bay Select Area begins on August 2, 2016. Modifications are consistent with action taken July 27, 2016 by the Departments of Fish and Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

27) 635-042-0031

Mainstem Columbia River Commercial Early Fall Drift Gill Net Seasons Set

Adopted July 27, 2016: effective August 7, 2016 through August 31, 2016.

This amended rule sets nine 9-hour fishing periods for the 2016 early fall commercial salmon drift gill net season in Zones 4 and 5 of the Columbia River mainstem. The first authorized fishing period begins at 9:00 p.m. Sunday, August 7, 2016 with further fishing periods scheduled through 6:00 a.m. Friday, August 26, 2016. Authorized sales include Chinook, coho, pink and sockeye salmon and shad. Modifications are consistent with action taken July 27, 2016 by the Departments of Fish & Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

28) 635-042-0160 and 63-042-0170

2016 Fall Commercial Seasons Set for Columbia River Select Areas

- Adopted July 27, 2016: effective August 24, 2016 through October 31, 2016.
- These amended rules set the 2016 fall commercial gill net salmon seasons for two Columbia River Select Areas including: Blind and Knappa sloughs and Tongue

Point/South Channel. Sales of Chinook, coho, pink and sockeye salmon and shad are allowed. Modifications are consistent with action taken July 27, 2016 by the Departments of Fish and Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.

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29) 635-014-0090 and 635-016-0090

Use of Two-Rod Validation in the Northwest and Southwest Angling Zones

Adopted August 3, 2016: effective August 4, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

This amended rule clarifies new regulations for usage of a Two-Rod Validation in the streams of the Northwest and Southwest angling zones. Modifications allow the use of two fishing rods in the streams that are open to angling for Chinook and hatchery coho salmon and hatchery steelhead. Two-rods cannot be used in any waters that are opened for wild coho retention. Only a single rod can be used when angling for any other game and non-game fish species.
