Dear Commissioners:

Ever since I and hundreds of thousands of other Oregonians voted for Measure 18, and two years later voted even more decisively to uphold it by rejecting Measure 34, I have watched the Oregon legislature and ODFW try to weaken and chip away at the choice made by the voters to give cougars more, not less, protections from killing and cruelty. Now that ODFW is working on an update to the cougar management plan, I urge this Commission to adopt a new approach that will reflect the wishes and values of the majority of Oregonians, rather than the narrow interests who want only to hunt them down and kill them.

First and foremost, get rid of the targets zones, which are nothing but an agency end-run around Measure 18. What I find most deplorable about the target zones is that they involve the very worst kinds of killing- by packs of hounds and wire neck snares – but in an official capacity by ODFW. The agency gives its blessings to individuals who engage in an unethical bloodsport and a federal agency (USDA Wildlife Services) infamous for its deliberate animal cruelty, its reckless use of lethal devices on public lands, its lies to the public, and its hiding of information about its programs and practices.

The plan must also prohibit the killing of cougars who wander too close to people or livestock unless all other efforts to deter the animal has failed. Cougars who happen to do nothing more than be in the wrong place at the wrong time should be humanely captured and relocated to a wilderness area so they can continue with their lives. Killing an otherwise healthy, normal cougar should be an absolute last resort, not the first kneejerk reaction.

I urge the Commission to adopt a cougar management plan that is based on the best cougar science available and that incorporates conservation and compassion as core tenets. Eliminate the target zones, kill problem cougars only as a last resort, and start managing our cougars for ALL Oregonians, not just those who view them as trophies or vermin. Oregonians have voted in favor of protecting these animals and the commission needs to adhere to the voters wishes.

Chair Finley, Commission members, and Director Melcher:

On behalf of The Humane Society of the United States (The HSUS) and our Oregon supporters, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony regarding the draft cougar management plan. We appreciate ODFW's efforts to update its cougar management practices and the steps the agency has taken to include us as a stakeholder in this process. Yet, it is apparent that ODFW has not included our specific and highly supported recommendations within the updated plan. Additionally, while the plan cites some of the latest scientific studies, it unfortunately fails to implement them.

Oregonians have twice opposed the use of hounds to hunt cougars. In 1994, voters passed Measure 18, and in 1996 a greater majority rejected a proposal to repeal Measure 18. In numerous polls and scientific surveys, Oregonians have indicated that they greatly value cougars, who are an icon of the American West and symbols of wildness and freedom. Yet despite these overwhelming statements in support of policies to protect our cougars from cruelty and persecution, ODFW continues to heed the wishes of a small minority who view them as either trophies or unwanted vermin.

The HSUS, an ODFW stakeholder, has advocated for Oregon cougars for over two decades, including during this current updated cougar plan drafting process. We had proposed several recommendations to improve the plan; yet, the ODFW's draft failed to incorporate them and, instead, continues to embrace an approach to cougar management that emphasizes mass killing over conservation and in opposition to the public's values.

Myth trumps the best available science in ODFW's draft cougar plan:

- The ODFW's persistent use of "target zones," the places where private houndsmen and federal agents are allowed to kill unlimited numbers of cougars, is scientifically unsupportable and inconsistent with Oregonians' values.
 - In the target zones, ODFW permits particularly cruel and unsporting methods: packs of trailing hounds and strangling cable neck snares—in contravention to the will of voters.
 - Targeting cougars disrupts their social structure and increases instability leading to massive mortality, including from cat-on-cat mortalities, especially upon dependent kittens and their mothers.
 - Despite the myths, killing massive numbers of cougars will neither reduce conflict with humans and livestock and won't create bountiful ungulate herds so that ODFW can sell more bighorn sheep-, deer- or elk-hunting tags.

- In Oregon, 45 percent of the total cougar mortality is a result of livestock protection or management kills, making Oregon a complete outlier for its target-zone killing program.

ODFW's cougar population figure is an over-inflated fabrication:

- ODFW must use the best available science to inform its cougar population estimates. ODFW's estimates for Zones B, C and E are higher than those found in any other state, and more than twice the average density of Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife's.
- ODFW's inflated cougar-population estimates inform unrealistic trophy-hunting quotas and unfairly justify other cougar persecution, including unlimited killing in target zones.
- ODFW's draft plan continues to jeopardize Oregon cougars and leaves their populations in a constant state of flux, which results in unwanted human and livestock conflicts.

ODFW must update its conflict policies:

ODFW permits scientifically unsupportable and needless killing purportedly to protect livestock, people or pets, making Oregon's cougar-conflict policies some of the most needlessly draconian in the U.S. Instead of using this approach, ODFW must educate livestock operators, including hobby ranchers, on non-lethal prevention methods including using secured covered pens for livestock and pets at night.

Simply seeing a cougar is not an emergency and should not result in a cougar's death, unless the cat poses a direct threat to human safety. Typically, migrating cougars are young subadults (or orphaned kittens) who leave human landscapes on their own, if given time and space.

The HSUS would like to work with ODFW to update its outdated policies and support the agency's implementation of proactive approaches and nonlethal tactics to prevent or reduce conflicts.

Our recommendations are supported by the best available science and will better conserve Oregon cougars *while reducing conflicts* and saving taxpayers' dollars from needlessly funding the USDA's Wildlife Services' cougar-killing program. We look forward to continuing to work with ODFW so that the draft cougar management plan better reflects the interests of all Oregon stakeholders. Thank you for your consideration.

Predator Defense does not support the draft of the Cougar Management Plan. Our concerns are the same as those expressed to you when we and other stakeholders testified at the Commission meeting in April of last year. And our concerns are the same as those expressed in our comments to the 2006 Cougar Management Plan and at subsequent commission meetings since then. In short we do not agree with (and current science does not support) the Plan's core contention that continually and indiscriminately increasing mortality is an effective or sound management strategy to address conflicts or diminishing ungulate herds. The specific problems with the Plan's design which have been articulated by Predator Defense, and expert cougar biologists as well, over the last 23 years were never addressed in a substantive manner, and although this draft gives lip service to some of them in a general manner, we see no real change in management approach or procedures in this revision.

The draft Plan cannot be called a conservation plan. It continues to utilize one single management tool: lethal control, to be implemented exhaustively and indiscriminately up until the minimum estimated population size of 1994 is reached. That population limit was not scientifically derived, but instead arbitrarily determined by politics. The plan's population model, which has been severely criticized, has not been changed or improved. The criteria used to trigger lethal control is still built on assumptions that current research has proven to be false: indiscriminate killing of predators does not reduce cougar/human conflicts or declining elk and deer herds. Lethal control through sport hunting and administrative removal of cougars over thousands of square miles of prime cougar habitat continues to be the one and only answer to conflicts and dwindling ungulate populations despite what the best science has demonstrated.

The people of Oregon have clearly indicated they want to see cougars managed to benefit Oregon's ecosystem and the cougar population itself, not to benefit special interests of hunters and ranchers. Unfortunately, this Plan continues to do just that.

Chair Finley, Commissioners, for the record my name is Nick Cady. I am the legal director for Cascadia Wildlands. I live in Eugene, where our principal office is located.

Cascadia Wildlands has been in conversations with the Department regarding the revision of the cougar management plan, and have two principal points to make regarding the new draft plan.

First, we are encouraged by the efforts of the Department to develop a more accurate population count for cougars across the state. Previously, the Department has relied upon exceptionally high density estimates, and we would ask the Commission to require the Department to replicate some of the affordable, scat-sampling population density modeling that has taken place in several management areas in Northeastern Oregon to be replicated across the state. This will provide a statewide cougar population estimate actually based on gathered data, and more fully allow the Department to make sound management decisions for the species in ensuring cougar populations are at optimum levels across the state.

Second, we would ask the Commission to instruct the Department to eliminate the target zone approach from the draft cougar plan. The target zone approach involves proactively killing cougars, at the Department's expense, in order to test hypotheses that this cougar killing will reduce conflict or increase ungulate populations. We believe the target area approach is a waste of Departmental resources because it is ineffective and not supported by sound science.

The science review conducted by the Department relating to cougar mortality on ungulates found that cougar kills on ungulates is largely compensatory, in that it did not have an effect on overall population levels of deer and elk. These conclusions in the science review were supported further by the Department's own monitoring of target zone effectiveness. The target zones to manipulate mule deer populations were not effective, they failed. The target zones to increase elk populations resulted in an increased calf to cow ratio in two of the five target areas, but that these numbers were not reliable because multiple herds gathered in the same winter range when the Department was attempting to do its count. Overall, the Department concluded that these elk populations would recover without spending resources on cougar removal. Draft Plan at 61. If the science says cougar predation will not influence ungulate numbers, the Department should not be spending money to kill cougars to attempt to increase deer and elk numbers.

Further, conflict levels with cougars have been stable or decreasing across the state and this is without the Department implementing any target areas to address conflicts. The Department did attempt to implement a target zone in one area to attempt to proactively reduce conflicts, but it failed due to logistic practicalities. If conflicts/complaints are decreasing across the state, the Department does not need to spend money implementing targets areas. The Department reiterates that the simple removal of offending cougars addresses these problems.

If the Department does proceed with the target zone approach, Cascadia Wildlands believes there needs to be a thorough financial cost/benefit analysis. How much does properly implementing a target zone cost? How much does simply removing offending animals cost? Even if the target zone is assumed to be effective at some scale, does this decision make sense financially? Again, if the Department wants to implement target zones to increase ungulate growth rates (recall ungulates are recovering in these areas absent any target zone), the Department should establish that the money spent on the target zones is exceeded by increased tag sales in response. Does increasing ungulate populations amount to increased hunting tag sales? By how much? Are enough additional tags sold to justify the target zone?

None of these critical issues have been addressed by the Department. The Department is testing hypotheses related to cougar removal without even first determining whether the practice makes sense from a financial perspective. We would ask the Commission to request this analysis prior to the implementation of any further target zones.
