**Subject:** Feedback - Future of OR Elk Hunting

Commission,

I recently learned there is a push to change several of the eastern OR hunting units from over the counter (OTC) tags to limited draw units. Specifically, I'm referring to Starkey, Ukiah, Desolation and possibly Heppner units.

This marks my 5<sup>th</sup> consecutive year of hunting in OR. I am an out of state hunter coming from WA and the reason I've turned to OR is because of the opportunity it provides. Unfortunately my home state does not offer what I consider to be the same type of opportunity. Sure I can buy an OTC tag and hunt branched bull elk along the coastal range. All of WA's eastside branched bull hunting is by draw only and the only way I'm allowed to put in is if I commit to hunting the eastern side of the state, which is spike and cow only should I not draw a limited tag. OR on the other hand offers me the opportunity to hunt branched bulls in and around the Blue Mountains.

By moving forward with the plan to change these units to draw and limiting the number of out of state tags to <5%, that would pretty much end my opportunity to hunt these units as well as the rest of my group's.

I would ask that you reconsider this change and instead consider the reduction in depredation in these units by increasing government sponsored hunting for bear and cougar or allow hound hunting in the area for these species. In the last 5 years, I have seen 4 cougar and over 20 bear. My hunting party combined has seen 7 cougar and >35 bear. In fact last week we found tracks of 2 different cougar and found a fresh calf elk that had been killed by a cougar within 100 yards of where I called in a calf just 2 days prior. I'm guessing it was the same calf.

Please do not reduce the archery opportunity by restricting these units to limited draws.

I can't believe the panel would allow a hunt at this time. I only hunted 1 1/2 days and gave it up. I never saw a thing, not even a jack rabbit. I then went to Baker City and explored the snake river areas for fishing. I never saw an Antelope the whole five days I was over there. Only saw big horn sheep. I left on the 23rd of August and returned on the 28th. August is just too hot to have an antelope hunt.
