19 **Adopt Temporary Rules**

20 Curt Melcher, Director, requested the Commission ratify the following temporary rules. The  
21 fourteen (14) temporary rules were previously adopted by the director under his emergency action  
22 authority.

23 **1. 635-005-0466**

24 Commercial Dungeness crab Evisceration Requirement for Oregon/Washington Border to Point  
25 Chehalis, Washington

26 Adopted February 12, 2021: effective February 12, 2021 through August 6, 2021.

27 This amended rule prohibits landing of Dungeness crab harvested for commercial purposes from  
28 the Oregon/Washington border (46° 15' 00" N. Lat.) northward to the Point Chehalis, Washington  
29 (46° 53' 18" N. Lat.), unless they are processed in accordance with Oregon Department of  
30 Agriculture temporary OAR 603-025-0424, pertaining to requirements to eviscerate crab  
31 commercially harvested from areas with elevated bio toxins.

32 **2. 635-042-0145**

33 Set 2021 Non-Tribal Commercial Fishing Seasons in Youngs Bay Select Area

34 Adopted February 17, 2021: effective February 18, 2021 through July 29, 2021.

35 This amended rule sets the 2021 open fishing periods and gear requirements for non-tribal  
36 commercial winter, spring, and summer season salmon fisheries in Youngs Bay and Upper Youngs  
37 Bay.

38 **3. 635-042-0160**

39 Set 2021 Commercial Fishing Seasons in Blind Slough and Knappa Slough Select Areas

40 Adopted February 18, 2021: effective February 18, 2021 through July 2, 2021.

1 This amended rule sets the 2021 open fishing periods and gear requirements for commercial  
2 winter, spring, and summer season salmon fisheries in the Blind Slough and Knappa Slough Select  
3 Areas.

4 *Modifications are consistent with action taken February 16 by the Departments of Fish & Wildlife*  
5 *for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.*

6 **4. 635-042-0180**

7 Set 2021 Commercial Fishing Seasons in the Deep River Select Area

8 Adopted February 18, 2021: effective February 18, 2021 through July 2, 2021.

9 This amended rule sets the 2021 open fishing periods and gear requirements for commercial winter  
10 and spring season salmon fisheries in Deep River.

11 *Modifications are consistent with action taken by the Departments of Fish & Wildlife for the States*  
12 *of Oregon and Washington at the February 16 Columbia River Compact.*

14 **5. 635-042-0170**

15 Set 2021 Commercial Fishing Seasons in Tongue Point and South Channel Select Areas

16 Adopted February 18, 2021: effective February 18, 2021 through July 2, 2021.

17 This amended rule sets the 2021 open fishing periods and gear requirements for commercial  
18 winter, spring, and summer season salmon fisheries in the Tongue Point and South Channel Select  
19 Areas.

20 *Modifications are consistent with action taken February 16 by the Departments of Fish & Wildlife*  
21 *for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.*

22 **6. 635-041-0064**

23 2021 Columbia River Winter Treaty Commercial Fisheries Area and Season Revisions

24 Adopted February 23, 2021: effective February 23, 2021 through March 19, 2021.

25 This amended rule closes the 2021 winter treaty tribal hook and line platform fishery effective  
26 March 19, 2021.

27 *Modifications are consistent with actions taken January 26, 2021 by the Departments of Fish &*  
28 *Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.*

29 **7. 635-041-0065**

30 Set 2021 Columbia River Winter Treaty Commercial Fisheries

31 Adopted February 23, 2021: effective February 24, 2021 through March 5, 2021.

32 This amended rule implements the 2021 winter treaty commercial gillnet fishery season from  
33 February 24-26 in the John Day Pool and March 1-5 in the Bonneville Pool.

34 *Modifications are consistent with actions taken February 23, 2021 by the Departments of Fish &*  
35 *Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.*

36 **8. 635-042-0130**

37 Extend the 2021 Columbia River Commercial Smelt Fishery

38 Adopted February 24, 2021: effective February 26, 2021 through March 11, 2021.

1 This amended rule extends the 2021 Columbia River commercial smelt season for Zones 1 through  
2 3 through March 11, 2021.

3 *Modifications are consistent with action taken February 24 by the Departments of Fish & Wildlife*  
4 *for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.*

5 **9. 635-023-0125**

6 Set 2021 Recreational Spring Fishing Seasons in the Columbia River

7 Adopted February 26, 2021: effective February 26, 2021 through March 31, 2021.

8 This amended rule sets the 2021 open fishing periods and requirements for recreational spring  
9 salmon fisheries in the Columbia River and Select Areas. The rule establishes seasons for spring  
10 salmon by modifying permanent regulations in areas downstream of Bonneville Dam and updating  
11 bag limits in areas upstream of Bonneville Dam beginning March 16, 2021.

12 *Modifications are consistent with actions taken February 23, 2021 by the Departments of Fish &*  
13 *Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.*

14 **10. 635-023-0125**

15 Set 2021 Recreational Spring Fishing Seasons in the Columbia River

16 Adopted February 26, 2021: effective April 1, 2021 through June 15, 2021.

17 This amended rule extends the 2021 open fishing periods and requirements for recreational spring  
18 salmon fisheries in the Columbia River and Select Areas. The rule modifies permanent regulations  
19 through April 4, 2021 in areas downstream of Bonneville Dam and establishes seasons for spring  
20 salmon in areas upstream of Bonneville Dam through May 5, 2021.

21 *Modifications are consistent with actions taken February 23, 2021 by the Departments of Fish &*  
22 *Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington at a meeting of the Columbia River Compact.*

23 **11. 635-005-0466**

24 Commercial Dungeness crab Evisceration Requirement for Areas outside Oregon with Elevated  
25 Domoic Acid in Viscera

26 Adopted March 3, 2021: effective March 3, 2021 through August 6, 2021.

27 This amended rule prohibits landing of Dungeness crab harvested for commercial purposes from  
28 an area outside Oregon in which crab viscera samples showed domoic acid levels of 30 ppm or  
29 higher, unless they are processed in accordance with Oregon Department of Agriculture temporary  
30 OAR 603-025-0425, pertaining to requirements to eviscerate crab commercially harvested from  
31 areas with elevated bio toxins.

32 **12. 635-042-0145**

33 Revise 2021 Commercial Fishing Seasons in Youngs Bay Select Area

34 Adopted March 5, 2021: effective March 8, 2021 through July 29, 2021.

35 This amended rule extends the fishery length an additional 8 hours per day for the March 8, March  
36 10, and March 11, 2021 open salmon fishing periods in the Youngs Bay Select Area.

37 **13. 635-003-0003, 635-013-0003**

38 Adopt Early-Season 2021 Ocean Salmon Fisheries by Reference to Existing Federal Regulations

1 Adopted March 9, 2021: effective March 15, 2021 through May 15, 2021.

2 This amended rule implements 2021 ocean salmon fishing seasons for Oregon state waters  
3 occurring prior to May 16, 2021 to match those implemented in 2020 by the National Marine  
4 Fisheries Service (NMFS). This subset of expected fishery seasons may be modified by federal in-  
5 season action prior to May 16, 2021.

6 *At their scheduled April 23, 2021 hearing, the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission (OFWC) will*  
7 *consider permanent rules to adopt, by reference, new federal rules that will begin May 16, 2021.*

8 **14. 635-023-0095**

9 Close White Sturgeon Recreational Retention in John Day Pool

10 Adopted March 16, 2021: effective March 19, 2021 through June 30, 2021.

11 This amended rule closes the retention of white sturgeon in the John Day Pool and adjacent  
12 tributaries of the Columbia River. Catch projections indicate retention of white sturgeon after  
13 March 18, 2021 would exceed the allowable quota. Catch and release sturgeon fishing remains  
14 open in these waters, except for within the sturgeon sanctuaries as specified in perminate rules.

“Fishing Gear - Squid Fishery

33 (1) For the purposes of OAR 635-005-0930 through 635-005-0922 and 635-012-0030 through  
34 635-012-0150, “take” is defined to include attracting any squid by light.

35 (2) It is unlawful to take market squid for commercial purposes using a purse seine net that is not  
36 pursed using a rib line that is a minimum of 18 inches above the lead line. **In addition, it is**  
37 **unlawful to take market squid for commercial purposes using a purse seine net that is not**  
38 **pursed using a rib line that is a minimum of 36 inches above the lead line commencing**  
39 **January 1, 2022.**  
40

41 Commissioner Spelbrink seconded the motion and the motion was carried six (6) in favor.

20  
21  
22  
23

24 Commissioner Labhart read the following statement into the record:

25  
26 First let me thank all of you who provided written, email and verbal testimony prior to the  
27 Commission meeting and in-person today. Very much appreciated and informative to this  
28 Commissioner.

29 As I understand the petition, it is to place the American and European mink on the list of  
30 prohibited species in Division 56 of OAR 635-056-0050. Division 56 regulates human activity  
31 involving “nonnative” wildlife.

32 In accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act (APA), the Commission must consider six  
33 factors in determining whether to initiate rulemaking or to deny the petition. I will discuss each of  
34 those factors in some detail.

35 **Factor 1.**

36 **Continued need for the rule**

37 Again, Division 56 is specifically designed to regulate human actions involving  
38 “nonnative” wildlife. The American Mink is classified as native to Oregon. American

1 Mink are not allowed to be captured from the wild or held with exception that American  
2 mink can be held by a commercial fur farm under the authority and jurisdiction of ODA.

3 The European mink is native to Europe. They are nonnative to Oregon. OAR 635-056-  
4 0040 does not allow importation or possession of nonnative wildlife so they are considered  
5 as a prohibited species. ODF&W has never been requested to classify the nonnative  
6 European Mink as a controlled species and even then, this would likely not happen as  
7 European Mink fall under an International jurisdiction Red List of threatened species that  
8 essentially prohibits importation or possession of European Mink in Oregon.

9 ODA ORS 596.010 (3) specifically defines livestock, which includes domesticated fur-  
10 bearing animals and such are not within the purview of state game laws under ORS  
11 596.020 (2). More on this later.

12 Commercial fur farming is regulated by ODA in Oregon statutorily not ODF&W.

13 **Factor 2**

14 **The nature of the complaints or comments received concerning the rule from the public.**

15 The Commission has received written letters, emails and public testimony prior to and  
16 during this Commission meeting in compliance with this factor.

17  
18 **Factor 3**

19 **The complexity of the rule**

20 The request by the petitioners is to simply add the American and European mink to the  
21 prohibited species list. The issue for me is that I believe this in our purview as  
22 domesticated furbearer animals are statutorily regulated by ODA not ODF&W as I  
23 explained in Factor 1. The petitioners argue that because the American Mink meet the  
24 definition of livestock, they are thus nonnative. Our OAR 635-056-0010 lists the American  
25 Mink as native wildlife. Even if the American Mink when held at fur farms were defined  
26 as nonnative, they would in my opinion still fall under the purview of ODA not ODF&W  
27 because fur farming is regulated by ODA not ODF&W.

28 **Factor 4**

29 **This factor discusses rule overlaps, duplication or conflicts with other local, state and federal  
30 regulations.**

31 It's my believe that the petitioners are requesting oversight by the Commission/Department  
32 in regards to the commercial breeding and maintenance of mink in pens, cages and hutches  
33 which falls entirely under ODA regulations not ODF&W regulations. To add to this  
34 assertion, our ORS 498.002 specifically prohibits the capture, and/or holding of native  
35 American Mink from the wild.

36 **Factor 5**

37 **The degree to which technology, economic conditions or other factors have changed in the  
38 subject being discussed affected by a rule.**

39 The petitioners outline the recent outbreak of COVID 19 in some commercial fur farms and  
40 concerns for transmission outside the fur farms to the public. Valid concerns for sure. A  
41 facility in Oregon had such an occurrence. ODA and OHA immediately responded to the  
42 outbreak to curtail the outbreak at the commercial facility as they regulate commercial fur  
43 farms. ODA hired Wildlife Services to trap and removed more than a dozen animals  
44 around the facility, including possums, cats, skunks and three escaped mink. Two escaped

1 mink tested positive. ODA quarantined the facility and after the USDA veterinary services  
2 lab confirmed the last two rounds of samples at the facility showed no virus the quarantine  
3 was lifted by ODA. OHA officials believe the mink contracted the virus from the workers  
4 at the farm. ODA hired Wildlife Services to trap and they removed more than a dozen  
5 animals around the facility

6 **Factor 6**

7 **Statutory citation or legal basis for the rule**

8 The legal basis for the Division 56 rules has not changed and are still relevant today.

9 In summary, the commercial fur farming industry in Oregon is statutorily regulated by ODA not  
10 ODF&W. The goal of the petition is to place two species of mink on the prohibited species list per  
11 Div. 56. Div. 56 specifically regulates nonnative wildlife. The American Mink is a native wildlife  
12 species. The European Mink is nonnative ICUN Red List species, which makes it prohibited from  
13 importation or possession. In addition, Div. 44 prohibits holding native mink from the wild.

14 Domesticated mink in commercial mink farms is administered by ODA rules and regulations. We  
15 need to be concerned about COVID 19 infections of fur farms but that falls under the jurisdiction  
16 of ODA and OHA not ODF&W for commercial fur farms.

17 I will not be supporting moving this petition forward.

18 Action:

19 Commissioner Zarnowitz moved deny the petition and direct staff to notify the petitioner in  
20 writing. Commissioner Spelbrink seconded the motion and the motion was carried four (4) in  
21 favor-Zarnowitz, Spelbrink, Labhart, Hatfield-Hyde; one (1) opposed- Wahl; one (1) abstained –  
22 Wolley.

23  
24 Chair Wahl adjourned the meeting at 4:40 p.m.
