19 **Adopt Temporary Rules**

20 Director Curt Melcher requested the Commission ratify the following temporary rules. The  
21 seventeen (17) temporary rules were previously adopted by the director under his emergency  
22 action authority.

23  
24 **1.) 635-023-0134**

25 **Open Recreational Hatchery Chinook Retention in the Snake River**

26 Adopted 05/17/2022: effective 05/18/2022 through 07/31/2022.

27 This amended rule allows retention of hatchery spring Chinook in the Hells Canyon  
28 section of the Snake River from May 18 through July 31.

29  
30 **2.) 635-017-0090**

31 **Close Retention of Chinook in Green Peter Reservoir**

32 Adopted 05/19/2022: effective 05/20/2022 through 08/15/2022.

33 This amended rule will close retention of Chinook in Green Peter Reservoir from May 20  
34 through October 31 consistent with similar waterbodies in the Willamette Zone (Detroit  
35 and Foster reservoirs) where Chinook have been released above dams.

36  
37 **3.) 635-005-0387**

38 **Close Intertidal Commercial Cockle Fishery in Tillamook Bay**

39 Adopted 05/20/2022: effective 05/21/2022 through 09/30/2022.

40 This amended rule closes the Tillamook Bay commercial intertidal cockle fishery on May  
41 21 as the fishery is projected to reach the 80,000-pound quota.

44 **4.) 635-016-0090**

45 **Increase Harvest Methods for Smallmouth Bass in the Coquille River**

46 Adopted 05/20/2022: effective 05/22/2022 through 06/30/2022.

1 This rule allows the use of bait, spears, and spear guns to harvest smallmouth bass in the  
2 Coquille River (mainstem), East Fork Coquille River, Middle Fork Coquille River, North  
3 Fork Coquille River, and South Fork Coquille River (mouth to USFS boundary near  
4 Powers) from May 22 through October 31.  
5

6 **5.) 635-023-0125**

7 **Extend Recreational Spring Chinook and Steelhead Retention Fisheries in the**  
8 **Columbia River**

9 Adopted 05/20/2022: effective 05/24/2022 through 06/15/2022.

10 This amended rule extends the retention fisheries for hatchery Chinook and hatchery  
11 steelhead in the Columbia River from Tongue Point/Rocky Point upstream to Bonneville  
12 Dam starting May 24 and from Bonneville Dam upstream to the Oregon/Washington  
13 border starting May 26.  
14

15 **6.) 635-042-0022**

16 **Adopt Non-Treaty Columbia River Commercial Mainstem Tangle Net Fishery**

17 Adopted 05/20/2022: effective 05/23/2022 through 05/24/2022.

18 These rules authorize one commercial fishing period for salmon, sturgeon, and shad  
19 fishery in a section of the Columbia River downstream of Bonneville Dam on May 23  
20 and modify allowable sales for fish harvested in the Select Areas during the mainstem  
21 commercial fishery.  
22

23 **7.) 635-042-0145, 635-042-0160, 635-042-0170, 635-042-0180**

24 **Adopt Non-Treaty Columbia River Commercial Mainstem Tangle Net Fishery**

25 Adopted 05/20/2022: 05/23/2022 through 07/31/2022.

26 These rules authorize one commercial fishing period for salmon, sturgeon, and shad  
27 fishery in a section of the Columbia River downstream of Bonneville Dam on May 23  
28 and modify allowable sales for fish harvested in the Select Areas during the mainstem  
29 commercial fishery.  
30

31 **8.) 635-018-0090**

32 **Close Deschutes River Fisheries**

33 Adopted 05/25/2022: effective 06/01/2022 through 06/30/2022.

34 This amended rule increases protections for wild summer steelhead in the Columbia  
35 River Basin by closing angling in the Deschutes River.  
36

37 **9.) 635-016-0090**

38 **Umpqua River Thermal Refuge Closures**

39 Adopted 05/31/2022: effective 06/01/2022 through 06/30/2022.

40 This amended rule will prohibit angling at the mouth of tributaries of the Mainstem  
41 Umpqua River from the Scottsburg Bridge upstream to the River Forks Park boat ramp.  
42  
43  
44

45 **10.) 635-023-0095**

46 **Authorize White Sturgeon Retention in the Lower Columbia River**

47 Adopted 06/03/2022: effective 06/08/2022 through 06/26/2022.

1 This amended rule allows recreational retention of white sturgeon in the mainstem  
2 Columbia River from the mouth at Buoy 10 upstream to Wauna Powerlines on June 8  
3 and June 11.  
4

5 **11.) 635-023-0125**

6 **Modify Recreational Spring Chinook and Steelhead Retention Fisheries in the**  
7 **Columbia River**

8 Adopted 06/03/2022: effective 06/04/2022 through 06/15/2022.

9 This amended rule modifies the open area and daily bag limit associated with retention  
10 fisheries for hatchery Chinook and hatchery steelhead in the Columbia River from  
11 Tongue Point/Rocky Point upstream to the Oregon/Washington border starting June 4.  
12

13 **12.) 635-041-0045**

14 **Set Treaty Commercial Spring and Summer Fisheries**

15 Adopted 06/03/2022: effective 06/04/2022 through 07/31/2022.

16 These amended rules authorize the sales of fish caught in treaty fisheries.

- 17 • Platform hook and line fisheries are open in Zone 6 (above Bonneville Dam) from June  
18 4 through July 31.
- 19 • Platform hook and line fisheries are open downstream from Bonneville Dam from June  
20 16 through July 31.
- 21 • Yakama Nation Zone 6 (Wind River, Drano Lake, and Klickitat River) fisheries are  
22 open June 4 until further notice.
- 23 • Gillnet fisheries are open in Zone 6 (above Bonneville Dam) during periods from June  
24 16 through July 1.

28 Adopted 06/03/2022: effective 06/04/2022 through 07/31/2022.

31 4 through July 31.
- 32 • Platform hook and line fisheries are open downstream from Bonneville Dam from June

35 open June 4 until further notice.

43 River all-depth area on Mondays from June 13 through June 20.  
44

45 Oregon and Washington share the recreational harvest quota in the Columbia River  
46 Subarea between Leadbetter Point, Washington and Cape Falcon, Oregon.

2 **Open Hatchery Chinook Fishing in Lookingglass Creek**

3 Adopted 06/09/2022: effective 06/10/2022 through 06/24/2022.

4 This rule allows recreational harvest of hatchery Chinook in Lookingglass Creek from  
5 June 10 through June 24.

7 **16.) 635-019-0090**

8 **Open Hatchery Chinook Fishing in the Imnaha and Wallowa Rivers**

9 Adopted 06/13/2022: effective 06/25/2022 through 07/24/2022.

10 This rule allows recreational harvest of hatchery Chinook in the Imnaha River from June  
11 25 through July 10 and in the Wallowa River from June 25 through July 24.

12  
13 **17.) 635-023-0128**

14 **Set Recreational Summer Salmon and Steelhead Retention Fisheries in the**  
15 **Columbia River**

16 Adopted 06/14/2022: effective 06/16/2022 through 07/31/2022.

17 This amended rule sets the Columbia River recreational salmon and steelhead fisheries  
18 from June 16 through July 31.

4 Vice-Chair Zarnowitz moved to amend OAR 635-050-0045(12(b)); the parts in the rule that is  
5 related to damage checks for restraining traps and snares be checked at least once every 48 hours  
6 and remove all animals; and then remove the remaining language in that subsection. Chair Wahl  
7 seconded the motion and the motion carried six (6) in favor – King, Khalil, Hatfield-Hyde,  
8 Labhart, Zarnowitz, Wahl; one opposed – Spelbrink

9  
10 Commissioner Zarnowitz moved to amend OAR 635, Division 008 and 050 as proposed by staff to  
11 set regulations and seasons for the harvest and pursuit of furbearing mammals including the staff  
12 recommendations shown on addendum one, and including the amendments adopted in the motion  
13 proceeding this motion. Commissioner Wahl seconded the motion, and the motion was carried six  
14 (6) in favor – King, Khalil, Hatfield-Hyde, Labhart, Zarnowitz, Wahl; one opposed – Spelbrink.
