18 Staff: Shannon Hurn, Deputy Director for Administration

19
20 Shannon reported to the Commission that the department is on track and is currently spending
21 below projections. While license product sales are down from 2021, the agency saw robust sales
22 during May’s controlled hunt period. Unrestricted cash balance finished at \$71.6 million, while
23 restricted cash came in at \$36 million, for a total of \$107.6 million. It was also reported that

1 department is on track to submit the budget to the Chief Financial Office (Department of
2 Administrative Services) later this August.

30 Vice-Chair Zarnowitz moved to support the recommendations of the Beaver Management
31 Workgroup (BMWG); prioritize landscape management options and strategies to increase beaver
32 modified floodplain for the fire resilience, climate change impact resilience, water retention, water
33 quantity and quality, increase biodiversity and other benefits beaver modified floodplain provides;
34 integrate agency program efforts, including Fish, Wildlife and Habitat Division, to meet the goal of
35 increased landscape scale restoration and implementing BMWG recommendations on federal lands
36 and other lands, such as associated with the Private Forest Accord (PFA); include increases to
37 beaver modified floodplain as a purpose in budget narratives and implementation of agency work,
38 including, e.g., the Good Neighbor, Western Streams and others; support engaging the BMWG to
39 continue in an advisory role for the implementation of the BMWG recommendations; within six
40 months (by end of February 2023), meet with the BMWG to present progress toward increasing
41 beaver modified floodplain on federal lands and other lands, such as PFA; and within 10 months
42 (by end of June, 2023), report to the Fish and Wildlife Commission on progress toward increasing
43 beaver modified floodplain on federal lands and other lands such as PFA, and on adaptive
44 management changes needed. Commissioner Hatfield-Hyde seconded the motion. The motion
45 carried, six (6) in favor; one (1) excused - Khalil.
46

1 In response to comments and questions from Commissioners Labhart and Spelbrink, staff
2 confirmed their understanding that the motion was consistent with the follow-up proposed by the
3 department.
4

5 **Adopt Temporary Rules**

6 Curt Melcher, Director, requested the Commission ratify the following temporary rules. The
7 Thirty-six (36) temporary rules were previously adopted by the director under his emergency
8 action authority.
9

10 **1) 635-019-0090**

11 **Extend Hatchery Chinook Fishing in the Willowa River**

12 Adopted 6/21/2022: effective 6/25/2022 through 7/24/2022.

13 This rule extends the downstream deadline for recreational harvest of hatchery Chinook in the
14 Willowa River by approximately two miles from June 25 through July 24.
15

16 **2) 635-005-0355**

17 **Close Commercial Dive Cockle Fishery in Tillamook Bay**

18 Adopted 6/21/2022: effective 6/22/2022 through 12/9/2022.

19 This amended rule closes the Tillamook Bay commercial dive cockle fishery on June 22 as the
20 fishery is projected to reach the 185,000-pound quota.
21

22 **3) 635-021-0090**

23 **Regulation Changes Related to High Temperatures and Low Water in the Southeast**
24 **Zone**

25 Adopted 6/21/2022: effective 6/22/2022 through 10/31/2022.

26 This amended rule addresses fishing regulations related to drought conditions throughout the
27 Southeast Zone. All size limits, bag limits, and gear restrictions for gamefish are lifted from
28 June 22 through October 31 in the following locations: Malheur Reservoir, portions of the
29 Malheur River, and Warm Springs Reservoir.
30

31 **4) 635-042-0160, 635-042-0170**

32 **Revise Summer Season Commercial Select Area Fisheries**

33 Adopted 6/22/2022: effective 6/22/2022 through 7/31/2022.

34 These rules extend open periods from 12 to 16 hours on Mondays and Thursdays and add 16
35 hour fishing periods on Wednesdays for commercial salmon, sturgeon, and shad in the Blind
36 Slough/Knappa Slough and Tongue Point/South Channel fisheries. Open periods are from
37 June 22 through July 15.
38

39 **5) 635-019-0090**

40 **Allow Bait for Hatchery Chinook Fishing in the Imnaha River**

41 Adopted 6/24/2022: effective 6/25/2022 through 7/24/2022.

42 This rule allows the use of bait for recreational angling for hatchery Chinook in the Imnaha
43 River from June 25 through July 24 from the mouth upstream to the Summit Creek bridge.
44

45 **6) 635-039-0085**

46 **Add Recreational Central Coast Subarea All Depth Halibut Fishing Periods**

47 Adopted 6/28/2022: effective 7/7/2022 through 7/30/2022.

1 This amended rule extends the recreational fishery for Pacific halibut in the Central Coast
2 Subarea all-depth area (Cape Falcon to Humbug Mountain) on Thursday through Saturday
3 weekly from July 7 through July 30.
4

5 **7) 635-004-0275**

6 **Federal Actions and Management Measures Implemented for Commercial Groundfish**
7 **Fisheries**

8 Adopted 6/30/2022: effective 7/5/2022 through 12/31/2022.

9 This amended rule adopts in-season actions previously adopted by the federal government for
10 2021- 2022 Pacific Coast Limited Entry Fixed Gear and Open Access commercial groundfish
11 fisheries, including but not limited to increases and reductions in sablefish trip limits
12 depending on time of year and fishery, and increases in lingcod trip limits.
13

14 **8) 635-016-0090**

15 **Increase Harvest Methods for Smallmouth Bass in the Coquille River**

16 Adopted 6/30/2022: effective 7/1/2022 through 10/31/2022.

17 This rule allows the use of bait, spears, and spear guns to harvest smallmouth bass in the
18 Coquille River (mainstem), East Fork Coquille River, Middle Fork Coquille River, North
19 Fork Coquille River, and South Fork Coquille River (mouth to USFS boundary near Powers)
20 from May 22 through October 31.
21

22 **9) 635-016-0090**

23 **Coastal Chinook Bag Limit Reductions and Area Closures**

24 Adopted 6/30/2022: effective 7/1/2022 through 10/31/2022.

25 This amended rule will modify bag limits, close salmon fishing, or implement other measures
26 for harvest of wild Chinook in specified Oregon coastal rivers from July 1 through December
27 31.
28

29 **10) 635-018-0090**

30 **Close Deschutes River Fisheries**

31 Adopted 6/30/2022: effective 7/1/2022 through 9/15/2022.

32 This amended rule increases protections for wild summer steelhead in the Columbia River
33 Basin by closing angling in the Deschutes River.
34

35 **11) 635-019-0090**

36 **Enact Steelhead Fishery Regulations in the John Day River**

37 Adopted 6/30/2022: effective 7/1/2022 through 7/24/2022.

38 This amended rule reduces the daily bag limit for hatchery steelhead from three to one from
39 July 1 through August 31 in the lower portion of the John Day River.
40

41 **12) 635-014-0090**

42 **Coastal Chinook Bag Limit Reductions and Area Closures**

43 Adopted 6/30/2022: effective 8/1/2022 through 12/31/2022.

44 This amended rule will modify bag limits, close salmon fishing, or implement other measures
45 for harvest of wild Chinook in specified Oregon coastal rivers from August 1 through
46 December 31.
47

1 **13) 635-018-0090**

2 **Enact Steelhead Fishery Regulations in Eagle Creek**

3 Adopted 6/30/2022: effective 7/1/2022 through 9/15/2022.

4 This amended reduces the daily bag limit for hatchery steelhead from three to one from July 1
5 through July 14 in the lower portion of Eagle Creek.

6
7 **14) 635-023-0128**

8 **Modify Recreational Summer Salmon and Steelhead Retention Fisheries in the**
9 **Columbia River**

10 Adopted 6/30/2022: effective 7/1/2022 through 7/31/2022.

11 This amended rule sets lower Columbia River recreational salmon fisheries from July 1
12 through July 13 and modifies the daily bag limit to allow harvest of sockeye in previously-
13 adopted fisheries from the Astoria-Megler Bridge upstream to to the OR/WA border
14 (upstream of McNary Dam) from July 1 through July 31.

15
16 **15) 635-041-0076**

17 **Authorize Sales in Treaty Commercial Summer Fishery**

18 Adopted 6/30/2022: effective 7/1/2022 through 7/31/2022.

19 These amended rules authorize the sale of fish caught in treaty gillnet fisheries open in Zone 6
20 (upstream of Bonneville Dam) during periods from July 4 through July 15.

21
22 **16) 635-042-0145**

23 **Expand the Summer Season Commercial Select Area Fishery in Youngs Bay**

24 Adopted 7/1/2022: effective 7/5/2022 through 7/31/2022.

25 These rules extend the length of open periods in the Youngs Bay Select Area commercial
26 fishery for part of the summer season (July 5-15).

27
28 **17) 635-018-0090**

29 **Enact Thermal Angling Sanctuaries in the Columbia and Deschutes Rivers, and Herman**
30 **and Eagle Creeks**

31 Adopted 7/11/2022: effective 7/15/2022 through 9/15/2022.

32 This amended rule closes angling in the central zone thermal angling sanctuary areas (lower
33 portions of Eagle Creek and Deschutes River) from July 15 through September 15.

34
35 **18) 635-023-0128**

36 **Enact Thermal Angling Sanctuaries in the Columbia River**

37 Adopted 7/11/2022: effective 7/15/2022 through 7/31/2022.

38 This amended rule closes angling in portions of the mainstem Columbia River adjacent to the
39 mouths of Eagle Creek and the Deschutes River, and that portion of Herman creek and lagoon
40 within the Columbia River Zone from July 15 through September 15.

41
42 **19) 635-014-0090**

43 **Siuslaw River Basin Angling Closure**

44 Adopted 7/11/2022: effective 8/1/2022 through 12/31/2022.

45 This amended rule clarifies that the temporary revisions closing angling implemented through
46 temporary filing DFW-78-2022 for the Siuslaw River apply to the entire Siuslaw River Basin
47 from August 1 through December 31.

1
2 **20) 635-016-0090**

3 **Coos River Basin Coastal Chinook Bag Limit Reduction**

4 Adopted 7/11/2022: effective 7/12/2022 through 10/31/2022.

5 This amended rule clarifies that the temporary revisions implemented through temporary
6 filing 75-2022 for the Coos River apply to the entire Coos River Basin from July 12 through
7 December 31.

8
9 **21) 635-023-0128**

10 **Modify Recreational Summer Salmon and Steelhead Retention Fisheries in the**
11 **Columbia River**

12 Adopted 7/13/2022: effective 7/15/2022 through 7/31/2022.

13 This amended rule extends harvest of hatchery Chinook in the lower Columbia River
14 recreational salmonid fishery from July 14 through July 31.

15
16 **22) 635-041-0076**

17 **Authorize Sales in Treaty Commercial Summer Fishery**

18 Adopted 7/13/2022: effective 7/18/2022 through 7/31/2022.

19 These amended rules authorize the sale of fish caught in treaty gillnet fisheries open in Zone 6
20 (upstream of Bonneville Dam) during periods from July 18 through July 28.

21
22 **23) 635-023-0095**

23 **Maintain White Sturgeon Retention Fishery Closure in the Columbia River**

24 Adopted 7/18/2022: effective 7/18/2022 through 12/31/2022.

25 This amended rule maintains a closure for retention of white sturgeon in the Columbia River
26 and all tributaries from Bonneville Dam upstream to McNary Dam. Modifications are
27 consistent with actions taken by the Departments of Fish and Wildlife for the States of Oregon
28 and Washington through joint state action.

29
30 **24) 635-023-0130**

31 **Set Recreational Fall Salmon and Steelhead Retention Fisheries in the Columbia River**

32 Adopted 7/19/2022: effective 8/1/2022 through 12/31/2022.

33 This amended rule sets the Columbia River recreational salmon and steelhead fisheries from
34 August 1 through December 31.

35
36 **25) 635-021-0090**

37 **Reduce Angling Restrictions in Heart Lake and Holbrook Reservoir**

38 Adopted 7/21/2022: effective 7/22/2022 through 10/31/2022.

39 This amended rule lifts all size limits, bag limits, and gear restrictions for gamefish from July
40 22 through October 31 in Holbrook Reservoir and July 22 through September 18 in Heart
41 Lake.

42
43 **26) 635-039-0085**

44 **Add Recreational Columbia River and Central Coast Subareas All Depth Halibut**
45 **Fishing Periods**

46 Adopted 7/21/2022: effective 8/4/2022 through 10/31/2022.

1 This amended rule extends the recreational fishery for Pacific halibut in the Central Coast
2 Subarea all-depth area (Cape Falcon to Humbug Mountain) on Thursday through Saturday
3 weekly from August 4 through October 31, and in the Columbia River Subarea on August 19,
4 25, 28, September 3, 4, and 23.

5
6 **27) 635-019-0090**

7 **Enact Steelhead Fishery Regulations in the John Day River**

8 Adopted 7/21/2022: effective 7/25/2021 through 12/31/2022.

9 This amended rule reduces the daily bag limit for hatchery steelhead from three to one from
10 July 1 through August 31 in the lower portion of the John Day River.

11
12 **28) 635-053-0005**

13 **Adopt Controlled Hunt Permit Numbers for 2022 Oregon Sage-Grouse Hunting Season**

14 Adopted: July 27, 2022 – Effective Dates: July 27, 2022, through January 22, 2023

15
16 This rule amendment is needed to establish the maximum number of permits that may be
17 issued for the purpose of hunting sage-grouse during the previously adopted September 10 -
18 September 18, 2022, Oregon controlled sage-grouse season.

19
20 **29) 635-017-0090**

21 **Extend Lamprey Fishery in Willamette River**

22 Adopted 7/27/2022: effective 7/27/2022 through 8/15/2022.

23 This amended rule extends the lamprey season through August 15 in the Willamette River at
24 Willamette Falls.

25
26 **30) 635-005-0355**

27 **Close Commercial Dive Butter Clam Fishery in Tillamook Bay**

28 Adopted 7/28/2022: effective 8/1/2022 through 12/9/2022.

29 This amended rule closes the Tillamook Bay commercial dive butter clam fishery on August 1
30 as the fishery is projected to reach the 225,000-pound quota.

31
32 **31) 635-042-0031, 635-042-0145, 635-042-0160, 635-042-0170, 635-042-0180**

33 **Adopt Select Area and Mainstem Columbia River Commercial Fisheries**

34 Adopted 7/28/2022: effective 8/1/2022 through 12/31/2022.

35 These rules implement 2022 fall Columbia River Mainstem and Select Area commercial
36 fisheries. The following fisheries are addressed by these rules: Columbia River Zones 4-5,
37 Blind/Knappa Slough, Tongue Point/South Channel, Youngs Bay, and Deep River.

38
39 **32) 635-041-0045**

40 **Set Treaty Commercial Fall Fisheries**

41 Adopted 7/28/2022: effective 8/1/2022 through 12/31/2022.

42 These amended rules authorize the sales of fish caught in treaty fisheries.

- 43 • Platform hook and line fisheries are open in Zone 6 (above Bonneville Dam) from August 1
44 through December 31.
- 45 • Platform hook and line fisheries are open downstream from Bonneville Dam from August 1
46 through October 31.

1 **33) 635-018-0090**

2 **Open Deschutes River Fisheries**

3 Adopted 7/29/2022: effective 7/29/2022 through 9/15/2022.

4 This amended rule lifts closures in the Deschutes River that were in place to increase
5 protections for wild summer steelhead in the Columbia River Basin. The closures will end
6 after August 14.

7
8 **34) 635-067-0000**

9 **Amend Rules to Modify Season Dates for Specified 2022 Oregon Controlled Deer and**
10 **Pronghorn Hunts**

11 Adopted: July 29, 2022 – Effective Dates: July 29, 2022, through December 31, 2022
12 Oregon Administrative Rules establishing season dates for 2022 controlled pronghorn
13 antelope, eastern Oregon deer hunts, and deer bow hunts were adopted September 17, 2021.
14 Season dates adopted at that time included date errors for three hunts shown in the hunt tables
