**Expenditure Report**

Staff: As of July 31, 2024, the department’s total cash balance was \$158.5 million, with \$82.2 million in unrestricted cash and \$76.3 million in restricted cash. The unrestricted cash includes a \$26 million insurance settlement from the 2020 wildfires. For the 2023-25 biennium, expenditures and revenues are tracking as expected, with agency expenditures through July at 35.2% of the approved budget, reflecting cost-saving measures.

1 The Agency Request Budget (ARB) was approved by the Commission in June and submitted to  
2 DAS and the Governor’s Office by the August 30th deadline. The next step is working with DAS  
3 and the Governor’s Office on the Governor’s Recommended Budget (GRB).  
4

5 For 2025 audit topics related to Safety and the Landowner Preference Program. The federal  
6 Department of Interior Office of Inspector General’s audit of Wildlife and Sportfish Restoration  
7 programs for fiscal years 2022-2023 is also ongoing, with federal auditors visiting sites and  
8 interviewing staff in October.

23 **Adopt Temporary Rules**

24 The Commission ratified the following temporary rules. The nine (9) temporary rules were  
25 previously adopted by the director under her emergency action authority.  
26

27 **1) 635-067-0000**

28 **Amend rules to modify open area for a 2024 Oregon controlled pronghorn**  
29 **antelope youth hunt.**

30 Adopted: August 13, 2024 – Effective Dates: August 13, 2024, through August 25,  
31 2024

32 Oregon Administrative Rules establishing hunt areas for 2024 controlled pronghorn  
33 antelope youth hunts were adopted by the Commission on September 15, 2023.

34 Amendment of these rules is necessary because of wildfires significantly impacting  
35 the ability of tag holders to participate in certain controlled youth hunts.  
36

37 **2) 635-041-0075**

38 **Authorize sales for Columbia River Treaty commercial fall gillnet fisheries**

39 Adopted 8/15/2024: effective 8/19/2024 through 12/31/2024.

40 These amended rules authorize the sales of fish caught in Zone 6 treaty commercial  
41 gillnet fisheries. Open fishing periods are from August 19 through August 22,  
42 August 26 through August 30, and September 2 through September 6.  
43

44 **3) 635-042-0032**

45 **Set Columbia River Non-Treaty Late Fall Commercial Tangle Net Salmon**  
46 **Fishery**

47 Adopted 8/23/2024: effective 9/16/2024 through 12/31/2024.

1 This rule authorizes 32 late fall non-Treaty commercial tangle net periods in Zones  
2 1-3 of the lower Columbia River.

3  
4 **4) 635-004-0355**

5 **Commercial Nearshore Fishery Limit Increases for Periods 5-6**

6 Adopted 8/29/2024: effective 9/1/2024 through 12/31/2024.

7 This amended rule will increase the commercial nearshore fishery two-month  
8 cumulative trip limits for black rockfish for periods 5-6 (September-December  
9 2024).

10  
11 **5) 635-042-0180**

12 **Modify Deep River Select Area fall-season commercial fishery**

13 Adopted 9/5/2024: effective 9/5/2024 through 12/31/2024.

14 This amended rule will modify the previously adopted periods for this fishery by  
15 adding five periods to the beginning of the 2024 fall season.

16  
17 **6) 635-041-0075**

18 **Authorize sales for Columbia River Treaty commercial fall gillnet fisheries**

19 Adopted 9/6/2024: effective 9/9/2024 through 12/31/2024.

20 These amended rules authorize the sales of fish caught in Zone 6 treaty  
21 commercial gillnet fisheries. This modification adds a fishing period from  
22 September 9 through September 13.

23  
24 **7) 635-041-0075**

25 **Authorize sales for Columbia River Treaty commercial fall gillnet fisheries**

26 Adopted 9/11/2024: effective 9/16/2024 through 12/31/2024.

27 These amended rules authorize the sales of fish caught in Zone 6 treaty commercial  
28 gillnet fisheries. This modification adds a fishing period from September 16 through  
29 September 20.

30  
31 **8) 635-042-0031, 635-042-0060**

32 **Set mainstem Columbia River late fall commercial gillnet fishery and modify  
33 commercial seine fishery**

34 Adopted 9/11/2024: effective 9/12/2024 through 12/31/2024.

35 This rule authorizes two commercial non-treaty gillnet fishing periods in the  
36 mainstem Columbia River commercial Zones 4-5 for September 12 through  
37 September 13 and September 17 through September 18. Additionally, this rule  
38 modifies the open hours for the currently-adopted commercial seine fishery.

39  
40 **9) 635-023-0130**

41 **Modify recreational fall-season salmon fisheries in the Columbia River**

42 Adopted 9/11/2024: effective 9/12/2024 through 12/31/2024.

43 This amended rule adds Chinook retention and increases the daily adult bag limit  
44 for the Columbia River recreational salmon fishery from the Buoy 10 line at the  
45 mouth of the river upstream to the west Puget Island line from September 12  
46 through September 22. It also extends the on-going Chinook and coho retention  
47 period for the fisheries from the Warrior Rock/Bachelor Island line upstream to

1 Bonneville Dam and from Bonneville Dam upstream to the Oregon/Washington  
2 border (upstream of McNary Dam) through September 22.  
3

### 41 **EXHIBIT B: COMMERCIAL DUNGENESS CRAB REGULATIONS**

42 The Commission adopted regulations for the ocean commercial Dungeness crab  
43 fishery including revisions to the Tri-State pre-season testing protocol, line marking  
44 requirements to help identify gear involved in marine life entanglements, electronic  
45 monitoring requirements for crab vessels transiting closed areas, and an exemption  
46 from derelict gear retrieval limits for state contracted vessels with approved waivers.  
47 The Commission was also provided an update on ODFW's progress developing a

1 Conservation Plan and Incidental Take Permit application for marine life  
2 entanglements.

8 *Presentation:* Staff presented to the Commission on the proposed crab fishery regulations,  
9 covering several key topics. The presentation included information on whale entanglements in  
10 West Coast crab gear, the reasons behind the increase in these entanglements, and the  
11 conservation plan strategy to address the issue. It also discussed Marine Life Entanglement  
12 Fishery Identification Measures, coordination efforts along the West Coast, and season opening  
13 and operational efficiency measures. Additional topics included the revised Tri-State Preseason  
14 Testing Protocol, closed area transit regulations, and in-season waivers for derelict gear recovery.

22 Commissioner Spelbrink declared a potential conflict of interest  
23

24 Following public testimony and discussions with staff, the Commission considered the  
25 different types of potential temporary line marks, and which should be permitted in the fishery.  
26 The Commission also expressed interest in delaying implementation of the staff proposal  
27 requiring marked surface gear line by one year to the start of the 2026-2027 season rather  
28 than the 2025-2026 season. Staff was requested to amend the original proposed  
29 Administrative Rules in Attachment 3 for further consideration by the Commission.  
30

31 With respect to the initial year when surface gear would require markings, legal counsel  
32 read into the record the exact line-specific changes in the amended Attachment 3  
33 (Administrative Rules) as shown on the screen and proposed by the department, as  
34 requested by the Commission. For the interim timing issue, the year 2025 was changed to  
35 2026 in lines 316, 328, and 336.  
36

37 Action:

1 Commissioner Labhart moved to adopt the proposed rule and rule amendments as set forth  
2 in Attachment 3 and consistent with the amendments read into the record by legal counsel.  
3 Commissioner Khalil seconded the motion, and the motion was carried six (6) in favor:  
4 Wahl, Hatfield-Hyde, Labhart, Spelbrink, Khalil, King.  
5

6 With respect to the specifics of temporary line markings, legal counsel read into the record  
7 the exact line-specific changes in the amended Attachment 3 (Administrative Rules) shown  
8 on the screen as proposed by the department, as requested by the Commission. For the  
9 method of applying the mark, the following rule amendments were proposed: line 329  
10 remove the word “solid” and replace with “clearly visible”; line 331 remove the word  
11 “cover” and replace with “extend”; line 331 between the words “entire” and “length”,  
12 insert the word “continuous”; line 331 remove the word “circumference”; line 332 between  
13 the words “two” and “feet”, insert the word “continuous”; and on line 332 between the  
14 words “two” and “feet”, insert the word “continuous”; and adding a new subsection E” “If  
15 using twine or similar material as the mark required by this rule it must be a minimum size  
16 of 0.125 inches diameter”.

17

5 Presentation: Staff presented to the Commission on progress implementing the 3-Year Beaver  
6 Action Plan. The plan is organized into four pillars of action that are intended to make progress  
7 towards landscape scale restoration of beaver habitat and beaver modified habitat. Pillar 1 is  
8 focused on data and science, implementation highlights include the establishment of 10 Beaver  
9 Emphasis Areas and associated funding for actions in these areas, adoption and implementation of  
10 a standardized survey protocol, and synthesis of existing ODFW datasets. Pillar 2 is focused on  
11 habitat restoration and implementation highlights include securing funding to develop a guidance  
12 manual for restoration of beaver habitat, adoption of more flexible fish passage rules and securing  
13 funding for beaver habitat work. Pillars 3 and 4 focus on beaver management and communication,  
14 implementation highlights include adoption of a damage complaint system to support coexistence  
15 efforts, adoption of harvest reporting to improve understanding of impacts, launching the BAP  
16 partnership, and funding and OCRF funding for partners to develop tools and resources for co-  
17 existence.

 2 Presentation: Staff presented to the Commission on the proposed 2025 Big Game Regulations,  
 3 covering a wide range of topics. The presentation included information on population management  
 4 strategies, the impacts of climate, drought, and fire, and the development of Big Game seasons. It  
 5 also included a review of the changes made to hunting regulations in 2021, as well as proposed  
 6 new regulations and provisions for emergency hunts and parking permits. Specific topics  
 7 addressed included black bear population management and its associated model, spring and fall  
 8 bear proposals, and cougar population management and monitoring. The presentation also covered  
 9 the management of ungulate species, including Bighorn Sheep, Rocky Mountain Goat, pronghorn,  
 10 elk, and both deer and mule deer populations. Additionally, Chronic Wasting Disease was  
 11 discussed as part of the overall presentation.
