Common Name: Oriental Weatherfish

Family: Cobitidae (Loaches) **Order:** Cypriniformes (carps)

Class: Actinopterygii (ray-finned fishes)
Species: Misgurnus anguillicaudatus
Other names: Dojo, weather loach,
Japanese Weatherfish, AmurWeatherfish
Origin: Northeast Asia and Central China

Size: Max. length 25 cm

Description:

- Long, cylindrical, eel-like body
- Clay-brown with greenish grey-brown marble markings on top
- Pale silver sides
- Mouth is small, narrow and sub-inferior surrounded by six barbells
- Lips thick and fleshy
- Caudal fin is rounded

Ecology:

- Found in slow moving or still waters with muddy or silty bottoms
- Diet is comprised of bottom-swelling animals, insect larvae, snails and worms
- Tolerates a wide range of water temperatures
- Can tolerate low oxygen level.

Status: Prohibited in Oregon. Exists in several populations in the state.

Interesting facts: Named because they become more active before large storms, predicting the weather

Potential Impact: Predation on native species, transmission of disease, competition with native-species trout, juvenile coho and chinook for food and habitat.

Action: Call 1-800-INVADER to report location. Do not return to the wild.
