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STOCK STATUS

- Chinook counts at Bonneville Dam from June 16 through July 18 total 59,119 adults. Summer Chinook passage is typically 87% complete by July 18.
- Sockeye counts at Bonneville Dam through July 18 total 384,756 fish. Sockeye passage is typically 99% complete by July 18.
- TAC met July 7 and downgraded the Summer Chinook run to 75,000 fish at the mouth of the Columbia River. That return to the Columbia, added to an ocean harvest of 1,200, gives an ocean abundance of 76,200. TAC met on July 12 and updated the sockeye run to 398,000 fish at the river mouth.
- The summer steelhead counting period at Bonneville Dam began April 1 and continued to June 30 for the Skamania stock. A total of 29,261 steelhead (11,276 unclipped) were counted during this time period and the run exceeded the preseason forecast (16,400 total, 3,300 wild)for Skamania steelhead. On July 1 the upriver A/B steelhead counting period began. From July 1 to July 18, a total of 84,680 steelhead have been counted at Bonneville which is significantly above average. Nearly 50% of the summer steelhead at Bonneville have been unclipped.

MANAGEMENT GUIDELINES

Management Agreements

- The 2008-2017 *U.S. v Oregon* Management Agreement (MA) provides specific fishery management guidelines for treaty and non-treaty summer season Chinook and sockeye fisheries. The treaty and non-treaty catch guidelines is 20,325 (26.7%) summer Chinook and the treaty catch guideline is 7% or 27,860 Sockeye.

2010 SUMMER SEASON TREATY FISHERIES

- The tribes re-opened the Zone 6 fisheries for both subsistence and commercial use at the beginning of the summer management period on June 16.
- The Zone 6 platform/hook and line fishery opened under its standard rules for both subsistence and commercial use and does not require Compact action at this time.
- The fisheries downstream of Bonneville Dam as well as Yakama tributary fisheries also do not require Compact action.
- The tribes have authorized five (5) Commercial Gillnet Openings.
- Preliminary total catches to date are shown in the table below.

- The tribes will propose setting an additional commercial gillnet opening. This opening will not require a mesh size restriction to limit the harvest of sockeye.
- The tribes will propose another commercial gillnet opening following the same regulations as previous openings.
- The tribes expect effort to continue to drop, but some fishers are still catching reasonable numbers of fish and prices have remained stable.
- The catch expectation in the sixth gillnet openings is 1,200 Chinook, 1,000 sockeye and 2,000 steelhead. These predicted catches are based on catch rates in the first five Gillnet openings and assume a total effort of approximately 200 nets.

FISHERY RECOMMENDATIONS

Zone 6 Commercial Gillnet Fishery

COMMERCIAL GILLNET SEASON

AREA: All of Zone 6

DATES: 6:00 AM Tuesday July 20, 2010 through 6:00 PM Thursday July 22 (2.5 days).

GEAR: There will be no mesh size restriction.

ALLOWABLE SALES: Chinook, steelhead, sockeye, walleye, shad, yellow perch, bass, and carp may be sold or retained for subsistence. Sturgeon may not be sold, but sturgeon from 43 to 54 inches fork length in The Dalles and John Day Pools and from 38 to 54 inches fork length in the Bonneville Pool may be kept for subsistence purposes. Sales of fish caught during the open period for gillnet fishing are allowed after the end of the open period as long as the fish were landed during the open period.

SANCTUARIES: All standard river mouth and dam sanctuaries shall remain in effect, with the exception of the Spring Creek Hatchery sanctuary, which is not necessary this time of year.

The 24 hour quick reporting rule is in effect for Washington commercial fish buyers.

- The expected harvest in the planned gillnet opening along with preliminary harvest to date are within the harvest limits based on the *U.S. v. Oregon* Management Agreement.
- Based on experience last year and effort checks this year, the fishery downstream of Bonneville Dam is expected to have very low effort and low catches in the summer and fall seasons in 2010.
- The tribes will monitor and report harvests.
- A net flight will occur during the proposed commercial gillnet opening to estimate the fishing effort.
- The tribes may propose a final summer commercial gillnet fishery next week dependant on the catches and effort in this week's fishery.

FUTURE MEETINGS

- The tribes may request a Compact Hearing late this week or next Monday.
